Brad Taylor has been appointed as the new part-time (0.5) Executive Officer of

the Tasmanian Council of Churches, and commenced in the position from 10th March.

The proverb "may you live in interesting times" springs to mind as he contemplates the challenges and opportunities ahead for the churches in Tasmania.

These are, without a doubt, challenging times for the world community, the Australian nation and Tasmania, let alone the churches. Yet, intrinsic to such times are the opportunities that together we begin to envisage, and then to embrace, in rising to meet these challenges.

"I firmly believe that we are in this together and only by working together will we find sustainable ways forward", says Brad.

Brad has worked as a social and community worker both on the urban fringe and inner city of Sydney. He was one of the first lay people in Australia to lead a Catholic parish (St. Mary's in Erskineville, Sydney) in the absence of a resident parish priest.

He managed the social justice initiatives for the Australian Province of the Catholic religious order, the Missionaries of the Sacred Heart. He has worked as a tertiary chaplain at the University of Sydney and at the Ultimo College of NSW TAFE, a role he job-shared with his partner, Jacinta Sinclair. Jacinta and Brad have one son, Isaac, almost 9 years old whom they home school.

Brad looks forward to the role of Executive Officer of the TCC and to the support of the churches to seek together and to make real that unity to which Jesus gently and challengingly calls us.

TCC ANNUAL MEETING SATURDAY 10 MAY, 2008

The TCC's 2008 Annual Meeting will be held at the Hobart Salvation Army Citadel, 180 Elizabeth Street, Hobart, from 9.30—3.00 pm on Saturday 10 May.

Keynote speaker will be the Rt. Rev'd Richard Appleby (pictured right), President of the National Council of Churches in Australia. Bishop Appleby is a long time supporter of the ecumenical movement, and was instrumental in the formation of the NCCA in 1994, playing an important part in the negotiations



that led to the membership of the Catholic Church. He has had an extensive ministry in the Anglican Church of Australia, having served as an Assistant Bishop in the Diocese of Newcastle, Bishop of the Northern Territory and prior to his retirement in 2006 was Assistant Bishop of the Anglican Diocese of Brisbane. You will recall that Bishop Appleby was to have been our guest speaker in 2007 but, due to illness, had to withdraw and so we are particularly pleased that he has been able to accept our invitation this year.

The keynote address will be given during the morning session of the meeting at approximately 11.15 am. Following Bishop Appleby's address, worship will include liturgy prepared for the Centenary of the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity.

During the Opening Worship of the meeting (at 10.00 am) Bradley Taylor will be commissioned as Executive Officer of the TCC. Bradley's commissioning will be a significant occasion for the TCC and its Member Churches and a new step in the ecumenical journey in Tasmania.

WEEK OF PRAYER FOR CHRISTIAN UNITY 2008 Marking the Centenary

'PRAY WITHOUT CEASING'

(1 Thess:17)

In 2008, the **Week of Prayer for Christian Unity** marks 100 years since the first 'Prayer Octave (eight days) for Christian Unity' began in 1908. These 8 days leading up to the feast of Pentecost (May 4-11) are a great opportunity to renew and deepen our relationships in the one God in whom we share in Jesus Christ.

The theme, appropriately, is 'Pray without ceasing' (1 Thess 5:17) and a variety of resources are available to allow Australians to join more effectively in the prayer for unity begun by Jesus himself when he prayed, 'that they may all be one ... So that the world may believe'. (John 17:21).

The 2008 resources, adapted for use in Australia, have their origin in Graymoor, USA, where the 'Prayer Octave for Christian Unity' originated in 1908. Adapted for use in Australia, they offer a fresh opportunity to churches to worship together locally, to witness to our unity in Christ, and to pray and act for a greater visible expression of that unity.

The TCC is encouraging church communities across Tasmania to arrange ecumenical events in their local areas to celebrate the centenary of the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity. What a wonderful way to demonstrate our unity in Christ as we recognise the unceasing prayer that happens across our community!

In Hobart, all are invited to share in worship at the Hobart Salvation Army Citadel at 12.30 pm on Saturday 10 May (following Bishop Appleby's keynote address at the Annual Meeting—see page 1). Please advertise this invitation widely through your congregations.

In Launceston, an ecumenical midweek service will be held— using the same theme. More details will follow on time and venue.

Journey of the World Youth Day Cross & Icon The Tasmanian Encounter: 11-19 May, 2008

Tasmanians are preparing themselves for the arrival of the WYD Cross & Icon, on Sunday 11th May. The Journey of the WYD Cross and Icon began for Australia on July 1st, 2007 when it embarked on a twelve-month pilgrimage around the country, as an integral component of the build up to World Youth Day in Sydney this July.

The Story So Far

In 1984 Pope John Paul II entrusted a 3.8 metre high wooden cross to young people from around the world as a symbol of faith. He encouraged them to "Carry it throughout the world as a symbol of Christ's love for humanity, and announce to everyone that only in the death and resurrection of Christ can we find salvation and redemption." (Rome, 22nd April 1984)

Since then the WYD Cross has journeyed throughout the world,

carried by young people to symbolise Christ's love. It has travelled throughout Europe, been smuggled behind the Iron Curtain, journeyed to Ground Zero in New York after the September 11 tragedy, to Rwanda, and to the Demilitarised Zone that separates the people of North Korea and South Korea. The message the Cross, and the pilgrims who carry it bring, is that of hope, healing and renewal in Christ.

On Palm Sunday 2003 Pope John Paul II presented an icon of Mary with the child Jesus, the *Salus Populi Romani* to young people to accompany the WYD Cross on its pilgrimage around the world.

Tasmania's Journey of the Cross and Icon will begin at an Archdiocesan Pentecost Mass at the Silverdome in Launceston, when Tasmanian pilgrims will be commissioned for WYD in Sydney. The JCI will then make its way around the state visiting sites of historic, environmental and spiritual significance. Visits to schools and parishes, youth concerts, processions, family days and involvement in the Pentecost Mass will allow people of all ages to experience the excitement and energy that has accompanied the Journey of the WYD Cross and Icon throughout the world.

"Take up your cross" takes on a whole new meaning for me now. The honour and joy of carrying the cross that Christ intended us to – not a heavy burden but a cross in my heart – a simple message of love and life that I can carry always and everywhere.' (Belinda Chapman, Handover of the WYD Cross & Icon to Australia, Palm Sunday, 2006).
